For the purposes of the DPCA Parade of Rescues, a "Rescued Doberman" is defined as a dog that becomes homeless and is then adopted—typically through a rescue organization or animal shelter. A stray dog that is found and kept by the finder also qualifies as a rescue.

This definition is distinct from dogs acquired through pet stores or breeders—even in cases where the breeder re-homes the dog—regardless of the intentions behind the transaction. The key difference is that adoption fees paid to rescue organizations or shelters support the rescue of other dogs, rather than generating profit for individuals or businesses.
